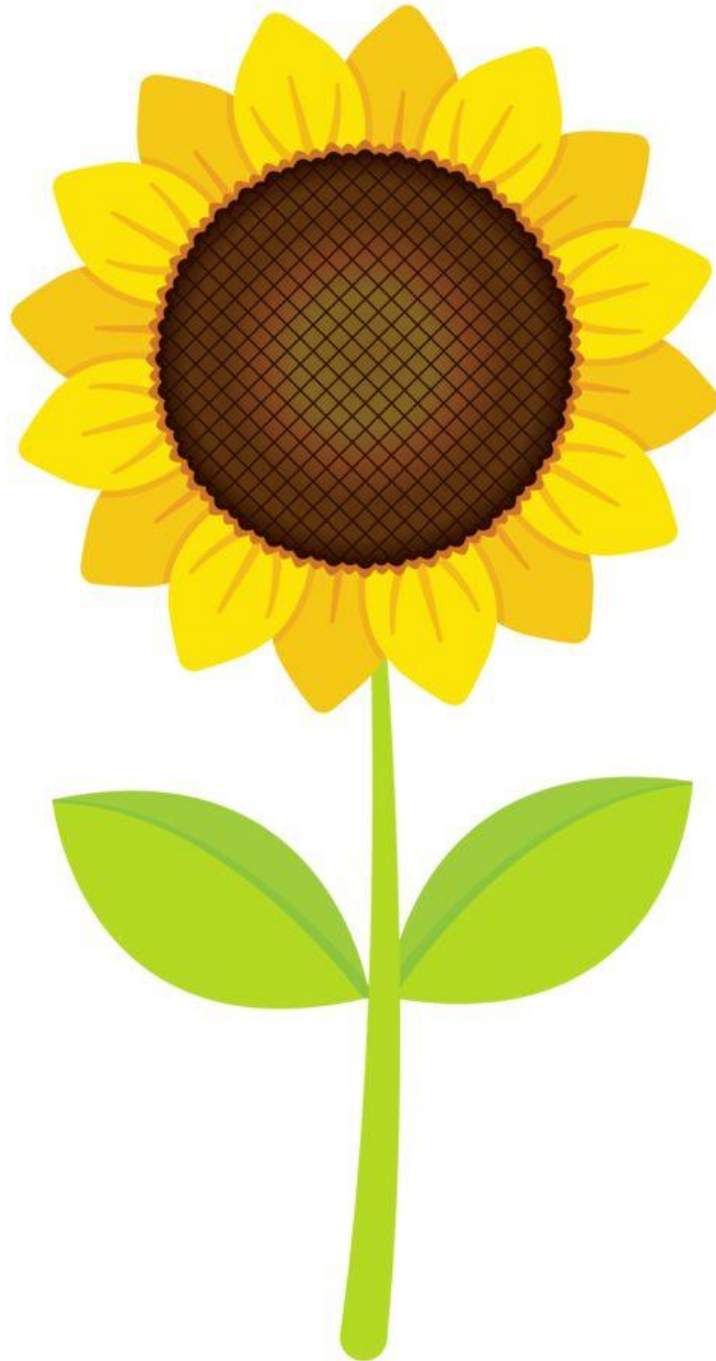

Dear Friends

Back in April TESS was launched into space. TESS stands for Transiting Exoplanet Survey Satellite. TESS will spend the next two years scanning 200,000 stars looking for exoplanets orbiting them. In recent years many new planets have been discovered orbiting other stars in the galaxy. The first ones discover big planets like Jupiter and Saturn, but since those first discoveries smaller more earth sized planet have been found and TESS is due to find yet more.

The discovery of other planets, some of which appear to be of the right kind to have life, always raises the question of whether or not we humans are alone in the universe. Despite numerous reports of UFO's alien abduction and various suggestions of conspiracies to cover up alien encounters (sadly the X Files were not real) there is no cast-iron evidence of the existence of aliens. The discovery of all the exoplanets increases the possibility. But even if a planet is in the right place how easy would it be for life to form and then evolve? If it is easy for life to form and then the universe will be teeming with life. If the formation of life needs very specific conditions and evolution isn't inevitable except within the right environment then it is possible that we are the only sentient self-conscious beings in the universe. Finding life or even the evidence that there was once life on Mars would greatly shift the possibilities in the direction of other beings.

If there are aliens would they be children of God and if they are would they be, so to speak of the same family as us? What sort of religion would they have? Would that religion bear any relationship to Christianity? Did God become incarnate in their history to bring them salvation as he did in ours in Jesus? A question asked by Sydney Carter in his song 'Every star shall sing a Carol' where the third verse asks 'Who can tell what other cradle high above the milky way still may rock the King of Heaven on another Christmas day'. It may be that Jesus was not just a unique revelation of God for us on earth but for the whole universe; in which case do we have the role of mission and evangelism to the universe and not the world?

Talking about aliens may seem like science fiction, but one purpose of good science fiction is to look at our own situation by reflecting on ones that are not influenced by the ties, emotions and historical baggage of our own. How would you talk about your faith to an alien? Does that give you any ideas about how you might talk about your faith to your fellow human beings?

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH

The Royal Coat of Arms above the South Door has been cleaned and restored by Cambridge Painting, Conservation, Restoration. The painting if not set up on the removal of the rood, was put up by compulsion in the Restoration in 1660 and was usually placed above the chancel screen this is the position in which Cole found the Arms of King George I in 1742 one side of the arms was the date 1721 a new frame was provided in 1829 at the cost of one pound, five shillings and six pence the original date of 1721 has been painted out and substituted by GR III. We remember that these Royal Coat of Arms formerly hung at the west end of the nave above the gallery, and when the tower arch was opened out in 1891 the arms were removed from the church, but found a place of refuge in the Rectory coach house, where they remained until 1909 when they were restored and placed in their present position over the south door in the nave (information taken from the book All Saints Church Horseheath by Catherine E Parsons, 1911). It is with grateful thanks to grants from The Leche Trust, Allchurches Trust Ltd. and Churchcare (Church Buildings Council) that enabled us to have this historical picture cleaned and restored.

HORSEHEATH PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting was held on Monday 14 May in the Village Hall. In attendance were 3 parishioners, our Parish Clerk Melanie Laing, our new District Councillor Geoff Harvey and our County Councillor Henry Batchelor.

District Council news – www.scambs.gov.uk

The District Council is now under the control of the LibDems and our ward (Balsham) has a new councillor, Geoff Harvey, from that party.

County Council news – www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk

Local Plan - The big ongoing issue has been the Local Plan that has been under review by a government inspector for well over four years and we now understand that the Inspector will finish her work in the next three months.

A1307 - We are expecting to hear the results of the recent consultation process on the plans of the Greater Cambridge Partnership in early June.

Park & Ride charges - The Greater Cambridge Partnership (City Deal) has agreed to take on the charge for parking at Cambridge's Park & Ride sites.

Highways

We were unsuccessful in our application for a Local Highways Initiative grant for new bus stop markings opposite the Cricket Field, upgrading pedestrian crossing at the A1307/Howards Lane and warning signs to indicate Howards Lane unsuitability for large vehicles. We are investigating other routes to progress these issues.

Defibrillator Units

There is a move to install defibrillators in villages and we are looking into the costs, grants and practicalities of installing units in Horseheath in the old telephone box and in Cardinals Green by the Notice Board. There is a further suggestion that old red telephone boxes are purchased to house the units.

Planning

Land adjacent to the Old Police House on Linton Road - Following refusal of the application to build eight (8) houses the landowner has appealed and our written representation is due to go to the Planning Inspectorate by the end of May when we expect to hear if we have been granted a hearing.

Barn adjacent to Bramley House, Cardinal's Green - Conversion to a dwelling approved subject to conditions.

Cardinal's Farm, Cardinal's Green – variations to existing plans for an outbuilding approved.

Biodiversity Grant

We were unsuccessful in our application for a Biodiversity grant to establish Red Mason bee nests in the Parish Burial Ground, as pollinators and bees in particular are in steep decline. We will be applying again and looking at other ways of funding this initiative

GDPR – General Data Protection Regulation

The Parish Council are affected by this new EU regulation and we are instigating the necessary steps to meet the requirements.

- Damaged road surface A1307/Linton Rd junction, A1307/Haverhill Road junction.
- Missing 30mph sign at village entrance from West Wickham

For any Highways issue we encourage people to complain independently to Cambs. County Council at www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk where there is a 'Report a Highways fault' form. We understand there is greater likelihood of action with more complaints.

Did you know you don't need to see your GP for hay fever treatment?

Hay fever and seasonal allergy treatments such as tablets, eye drops and nasal sprays are all easily available at low cost from your local pharmacy – no prescription from your GP required!

Antihistamines are usually the best treatment for hay fever and these can easily be bought from local pharmacies or supermarkets. Buying a packet of 30 tablets can cost as little as £2, but if a patient goes to their GP to get a prescription then it costs the NHS considerably more.

By going to the pharmacy you'll be saving yourself time and money, freeing up GP appointments for people with more urgent needs as well as doing your bit to help the NHS save money on unnecessary prescription costs.

Top tips to help ease hay fever symptoms:

- Keep house and car windows closed, especially when the pollen count is high (early morning between 7am to 9am and evenings between 5pm and 7pm)
- Avoid large grassy areas, woodland, cutting the grass and car fumes
- Wear wrap-around sunglasses
- Use petroleum jelly inside your nose to block inhalation of pollen
- Don't dry wash outside to avoid pollen sticking to your clothes
- When you get in from outside wash your hands, face, hair, rinse your eyes and change your clothes

Spring and Summer health - Stock up for summer!

The warmer weather often means that we spend more time getting out and about. That's why it is even more important to make sure you stock up on some summer self-care essentials in case you need them.

Key first aid essentials include:

- Painkillers, such as paracetamol or ibuprofen
- Antihistamines for allergies/hay fever
- Antiseptic cream for bites and stings
- Sunscreen at least factor 15
- Plasters and bandages
- Diarrhoea/constipation relief medication
- Travel sickness medication

When powering up your BBQ's and putting out the garden furniture for the summer season, be sure to take note of our top tips below to ensure you have a fun and safe summer in the garden.

- If cooking outdoors, always check barbeques over after winter storage, keep them on level ground and ensure they are sited away from sheds, fences, overhanging foliage and property
- Keep children and garden games well away from the cooking area and never leave the barbecue unattended
- If you have a bonfire, build it well away from buildings, tents or other flammable objects and make sure it is properly out when you leave
- When out in the countryside, extinguish cigarettes properly and dispose of them responsibly – never throw a lit cigarette into a field or wooded area.
- Don't forget to stay safe around our county's waterways and if you see someone in trouble in water, call 999 immediately with clear details of your location
- When out camping or using a tent, never use candles inside or nearby and always discourage smoking nearby. Never cook inside a tent
