Dear Friends

Some of you will have just returned; some will be just about to go; some of you may be actually reading this on your holiday. Holiday time is here! In our evermore-frenetic world we all need opportunities to recharge our batteries. No doubt, we will find August all too short for this, so make the best of it. Whether you're planning to go abroad with a view to lounging in the sun, or chancing the weather in this, or simply spending some quite days at home holidays are a time for rest, for relaxation and for recreation.

The word recreation came into the English language in the 14th Century from the Old French which had taken it form the Latin *recreationem* –recovery form illness which itself comes form *recreare* – to refresh, restore revive (*re*– again + *creare* to create). I had been aware that recreation was being created again but lacking a classical education I had not appreciated its links with recovery from illness, although with a little thought it makes perfect sense.

The idea that our times of rest, relaxation and recreation are ones of healing seemed to me highly appropriate. It also points up the fact that healing is not just about curing bodily ailments. As human being we are not just bodies but a complex interaction of body, mind, soul and spirit who live and interact in a social setting. Distortions in any of these can lead to unease if not disease. In the world we live in all of us suffer from some distortion or another and are in need of healing. The Church of England report 'A Time to Heal' said

'Healing, we might say is what the Church's mission is about. Healing wholeness, salvation – these words embrace what God has achieved for us through the incarnation of Jesus Christ.'

Since moving here last year I have had ideas of developing the ministry of healing at All Saints Horseheath, with healing services with the laying on of hands and anointing. I would be glad to hear comments about such plans. If we do begin such a ministry in Horseheath we need to bear in mind that in the Christian context healing is not about some magical curing brought about by a 'healer' laying their hands on you but is more like going on holiday. It is a re-creation by the power of God Spirit, which enables us to face the world and ourselves.

Healing is going on all the time around us, in our hospitals, in homes, in our churches, and I hope on your holiday this year.

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH

A note was left in the church porch regarding the state of the grass etc in our churchyard. All Saints Church churchyard is what is known as a closed churchyard and when it was closed the upkeep was taken over by South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC). For the first few years we had the same contractor cutting the grass and strimming where necessary but now they seem to change contractors on an annual basis and this leads to problems at the beginning of a season. This year we had a period of wet weather before the contractor commenced his cutting and the grass had got extremely long. Another problem was that SCDC had not allowed for any strimming to be done and so the grass around the graves was very high. We called for a meeting between ourselves, the contractor & SCDC and resulted in the strimming to be re-commenced. Today apart from looking very dry the contractor is beginning to get it under control and we have been assured his contract is for two years. As churchwardens looking after your church we do our best to keep it in good order but sometimes the matter is taken out of our hands and it takes time to put it right.

Our Annual Garden Party held in the garden of Hartford House by kind permission of Jim, Phil and Francesca McCaughan, music by Duncan and Freddy was a great success again this year and thank you to all the helping hands for giving up your time £603-00 was raised towards the upkeep of our Church.

Our Children's Sunday Club continues to expand and we are currently learning to play the handbells. We meet on the first Sunday of every month 10am to 11am in Church, new members always welcome.

A meeting was held on Monday 9 July in the Village Hall. In attendance were 2 parishioners, our Parish Clerk Melanie Laing, our District Councillor Geoff Harvey. Our County Councillor Henry Batchelor was away on holiday.

The most newsworthy item from our councillor, Geoff Harvey, is the SCDC Business Fund for small business start-ups. Applications direct to SCDC please.

They are also starting a 'Blue Plaque' scheme for houses across the district. Let Geoff Harvey know - e-address above - if you had a famous former owner of your house and I would be grateful if you would let me know also for the Archives.

County Council news - www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk

Local Plan - The big ongoing issue has been the Local Plan that has been under review by a government inspector for well over four years and we now understand that if the plans are found 'sound', with any necessary modifications, they would be able to be adopted by the Councils. The aim would be to adopt by the end of September 2018. The big stumbling block has been the provision of a 5-year housing supply, which has now been met and has helped to defeat the appeal on the development on the Linton Road.

A1307 improvements, or to give it the full title, Cambridge South East Transport Study - In summer 2018, taking all of the supporting information and consultation responses into account, the Combined Authority and the GCP Executive Board will consider how to proceed with the project. The GCP Executive Board will decide if the phase 1 proposals presented should be developed further for implementation and choose a preferred strategy for phase 2.

They will then consult with us again on the details of the preferred strategy, should any of them be taken forward. For more info go to <a href="https://www.greatercambridge.org.uk/transport/trans

Highways

- New bus stop markings opposite the Cricket Field going eastwards will be undertaken when other road markings are done.
- We will re-submit our application for a Local Highways Initiative grant for upgrading pedestrian crossing at the A1307/Howards Lane and warning signs to indicate Howards Lane unsuitability for large vehicles.

Speedwatch

We are still struggling to form a team for this scheme where equipment is provided for villagers to record speeding cars in the village with a warning letter sent to those drivers who exceed the limit. Please contact John Miles - john.mileshpc@gmail.com.

Defibrillator Units

Last month I reported on an initiative to install defibrillators in villages and we have agreed to install units in Horseheath and in Cardinal's Green probably at the Village Hall and by the Mill Green turn, depending on permissions. The suggestion that old red telephone boxes are purchased to house the units proved too expensive.

Planning

Land adjacent to the Old Police House on Linton Road - Following refusal of the application to build 8 houses, the landowner appealed and this has just been dismissed by The Government Planning Inspector. The Parish Council submitted a 'written representation' against the appeal so are pleased with this result, which supports the view of the majority of the village, based on public meetings and surveys.

Flint Cottage - The Parish Council approved a two storey side extension on condition that Listed Building agreement was obtained, as it is in the curtilage of Norfolk House.

5 Meadow Cottages - The Parish Council approved a two storey rear extension.

The following applications are still out for consultation or enforcement: *Cottage Nursery* - retention of use of barn and storage buildings

Thistledown - ditch piped without permission

The Stables - various planning conditions need enforcement

Audley Way play area

Bench still to be installed.

Bike Racks

There have been two bikes, one black and one white, which apparently have been chained to the racks by the Cricket Field and are taking up space. These will be removed in 2 months if not claimed.

- damaged road surface A1307/Linton Rd junction, A1307/Haverhill Road junction.
- missing 30mph sign at village entrance from West Wickham

For any Highways issue we encourage people to complain independently to Cambs. County Council at www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk where there is a 'Report a Highways fault' form. We understand there is greater likelihood of action with more complaints.

Memories Event

The Horseheath Archives now runs to 14 volumes and over 700 photographs, along with a few books and DVD's and I would like to stage another 'Memories' event at The Village Hall but need to borrow/buy cheaply some display panels to show the photographs. We would need at least 27m panel space which would be over 1m off the floor or 12m if double-sided. It's been 10 years since the last event.

Tennis

I mentioned blue plaques above, so really should tell you about Harry Wendelken a potential future blue plaquer, who lives at Hydra on the West Wickham Road. This year he played in the Junior Championships at Wimbledon, where he was knocked out in the first round of the Boys Singles, but went all the way to the semi-finals of the Boys Doubles event. He is ranked no.5 in the UK and no.109 in the world in the Junior rankings. Harry is moving to a tennis school in Sweden later this year. Congratulations and good luck to Harry.

Allotments - There's still a vacancy for an allotment at Alington Terrace, Cardinals Green.

Article 4 directive

This intriguing title is a way to help protect landscape features, hedges and trees as well as significant, historic or valued, buildings that are not listed, which we will consider if we start drafting our neighbourhood plan, yet to be agreed.

Dual Carriageway Working Group (new Haverhill to Fourwentways motorway)

Here's an update from Georgina Magin from West Wickham's Group - "The Working Group has met every 6-8 weeks to monitor developments and agree actions. We have written to local councils, environmental authorities and politicians to make our views known, and have been in touch with other interested groups such as Cambridge Connect, Smarter Cambridge Transport, and Campaign for Better Transport. Recently – and after some chasing – the report that proposes the two routes for a new road (called the Pre-strategic Outline Business Case) was finally published - https://www.suffolk.gov.uk/assets/Roads-and-transport/public-transport-and-transport-planning/180516-A1307-Haverhill-2.3-Issued.pdf. It contains many weaknesses and flaws, not least that it completely

ignores the improvements to the current A1307 that seem very likely to go ahead under the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) initiative. The Working Group is preparing a response highlighting the main weaknesses in the report, which will be sent to relevant organisations and individuals in the coming weeks. Despite these weaknesses, the A1307 Strategy Board are (we believe) trying to move ahead with the next stage in developing the road, which is producing an Options Appraisal Report. Suffolk County Council has committed £10,000 to this next stage, but we do not know if any other sources of funding have been secured. We have received assurances from Cambridgeshire County Council and the GCP that neither of them will be putting any funds into it, which is encouraging. Lack of transparency of the A1307 Strategy Board remains a problem. This has been raised with our MP Lucy Fraser, and she has given assurances in a letter to our Parish Council Chair, Patrick Charlton, that the Strategy Board members will make greater effort to engage with the affected Parish Councils. However, there has not yet been any contact from the Strategy Board."

THE MEADOW SCHOOL, BALSHAM

As this academic year draws to end, it is an opportune time to reflect on all the successes of this year. Back in September, when teachers had planned the learning of the year in detail, mapped out the

school calendar and written the School Development plan, July seemed like an eternity away, and yet here we are again, looking back on another busy, but fulfilling year.

We have much to be proud of again this year. July is always a tense time as we await Key Stage Two SATS results to be published. We often question whether our philosophy of good quality teaching, alongside a wide, balanced and enriching curriculum, is enough to maintain the standards we have worked so hard for. However, once again, we are pleased to be able to say that results across all Key Stages are above National results, without the need to test the children continuously. Results from our youngest to our eldest children are worth sharing. 76% of our youngest children in Early Years achieved their 'good level of development' compared to 71% nationally. 95% of our Year 1 children passed their phonics screening, compared to 82% nationally and Key Stage 1 results for reading, writing and maths are 72%, compared to 65% nationally. The Year 6 children have once again excelled themselves, with 73% of children achieving the 'expected' standard in Reading, Writing and Maths, compared to 64% nationally. It is also well worth mentioning, that these results have been achieved, despite the ever increasing standards set by the government, pressures on schools to achieve, budget cuts and moving goal posts. We are so proud of the maturity our children show, their love for learning and their constant hard work. We are also enormously thankful to our hard working teachers and teaching assistants, who enable this learning to happen and to our parent community who support us in this work.

The Year 5 and 6 production is always a good testament to the quality of our wider curriculum, and this year was no different. After weeks of hard work learning songs, memorising lines, erecting scenery and rehearsing dances, the Year 5 and 6 children delighted us all with 'Robin and the Sherwood Hoodies!' Their performance to the whole school had even the youngest children in fits of giggles with some of their jokes and the performances to their adult audiences went exceptionally well. It is certainly not an exaggeration to say that it was one of the best productions I can remember since being at the school. Tears of laughter and pride were seen in the audience as the children performed with confidence, humour and some exceptional acting and singing talent. We hope that many of these Year 6 will go on to further acting at Linton Village College.

The gorgeous weather this summer has been perfect for our sporting fixtures. Key Stage 2 have participated in Kwik Cricket tournaments, Tag Rugby and even Cross-country running. Each time a team from The Meadow has headed out to play, we have been confident that they will participate fully and with a great team spirit. It is always a pleasure to take young and enthusiastic sports boys and girls to tournaments; and this year has been no exception. We look forward to a new set of tournaments in the Autumn.

As we bid our Year 6 a fond farewell, we look forward to our new arrivals joining us in September. They have already spent time getting to know the school and their teachers and we are confident that the start to their formal education will be really positive. We don't promise that their time in school will be easy, but we do promise that they will be joining a school with a firm ethos of good quality teaching, an enriching curriculum and plenty of opportunities to grow to love learning.
