

HORSEHEATH PARISH COUNCIL

A meeting was held on Monday 19 January in the Village Hall. In attendance were the Parish Clerk Bernard Yallop, our County Councillor Roger Hickford and two parishioners.

County Council news

I reported last time that the A1307 Traffic Survey report has finally been produced in draft form. The next stage is for Cambridgeshire County Council to commission a study to draw conclusions from the data and recommend solutions. We understand that the study will be commissioned once the Cambridge City Deal proposals are clearer. This topic is so important for Horseheath and will be monitored closely by us.

The reduction in gritting routes has been shelved so we will continue with the service as before.

It is proposed that street lights will go off at midnight and come on again at 6am to save energy costs. We can keep them on if we wish to pay so I would like to hear from anyone who would like this.

Speeding Control

The District Council have installed a second 'priority give way' island at the west end of the village just down from the Red Lion and we understand from villagers close by that this is already slowing traffic noticeably. However we also understand that the two householders affected were not consulted and we have taken this up with the District Council. We still hope to get a third 'priority give way' island at the east end of the village where we have yet to receive a programme of works. The broken gate and sign at the entrance to the village from Streetly End will be replaced.

Broadband

BT tell us that the work is due to be completed by March 2015 but a 'Go Live' date but cannot be confirmed. Internet service providers will be given two weeks' notice of the 'Go Live' date and will be proactive in informing existing customers of their options to upgrade their services. There is a separate article elsewhere on this issue on this subject.

Footpaths

The several owners of the land for path no.15 from Cardinals Green to the A1307 will be asked to cut back the undergrowth to clear the path.

S106 payments

Section 106 agreements, also known as planning obligations, are agreements between developers and local planning authorities that are negotiated as part of a condition of planning consent. We will have about £8,000 to spend in Horseheath due to recent house developments and the money is intended to be used for social and community projects, public transport, parks and open spaces. There have been a number of ideas and we are now costing: renewing the fence by the Cricket field; planting daffodil bulbs; upgrading the playground by the Village Hall; maybe looking at a scheme in Audley Way and would also like suggestions for Cardinals Green.

Burial ground access

We will hope to hear in January whether our grant application to construct a reinforced grass layby by the allotments on the West Wickham Road has succeeded.

Website

Parish Councillor John Miles has agreed to take over as our web supremo from Tori McKillen, who did so much to get the site developed and maintained for the last 3 years. We thank her for all her work on this. Do please let us know if you have any comments or things we should look at for the site - there is a link on the site.

Parish Council elections

The four year term for Parish Councillors is up this May and I would like to encourage villagers to get in touch if they would like to put themselves up for election, particularly as we have not had a Parish council election in Horseheath for 24 years and have co-opted most of the current Council.

Annual Parish Meeting

This will be on 24 April in The Village Hall. This is not a Parish Council meeting but we have the responsibility to set the date. It is an opportunity for all village clubs and organisations to report on activities during the year, and for villagers to discuss these as they wish and to speak on any matter of local interest. Last year we had a massive turnout of over 80 people to discuss the duelling of the A1307 and other transport ideas, an issue far from over. As before we expect our District and County Councillors will be in attendance and our Conservative parliamentary candidate Lucy Fraser will also be invited.

The next meeting will be on Monday 9 March 2015 at 7.45pm in the Village Hall. All welcome.

On behalf of all the staff and children at Castle Camps Primary School, I would like to wish you all a very happy new year. The staff and I are looking forward to working closely with the local community again in 2015 and we hope to see you at events scheduled for the term ahead.

It was a great joy to end last year on a high note with our two outstanding Christmas productions: 'The Nativity Story' (Key Stage 1) and 'Christmas 1914' (Key Stage 2). The children truly excelled themselves and we have greatly appreciated the positive comments and feedback from parents and members of the local community that were able to attend the shows. The children have enjoyed reading the thank you cards and emails sent in from appreciative members of the audience. Thanks must be extended to the staff, who worked tirelessly behind the scenes, ensuring the productions were a great success. Due to the overwhelming generosity of our audiences, we managed to raise an incredible £320 from our silver collections. These kind donations, alongside the £89 collected for our 'Christmas Jumper Day', will go towards purchasing new computing equipment.

I am pleased to report, that despite the excitement of Christmas, the children have returned to school rested, refreshed and ready for the months ahead. This term, we have many fantastic events planned, including: World Book Day, the Cambridge Science Festival, Bikeability, a Maths Workshop for Parents and the Mad Science Roadshow. We also look forward to welcoming back the Education Outreach Team from Wood Green Animal Shelter, who will be running workshops for the children on 'Caring For Pets' and 'Safety Around Dogs'. All these events will provide the children with a number of engaging activities to stimulate their interest and develop their knowledge and understanding in a practical way.

At Castle Camps, we strive to make sure that lessons are fun, engaging and creative, but we also work hard to ensure that our children leave school equipped with the basic literacy and mathematical skills that will support them as lifelong learners. new library for the children to enjoy. NEWS FROM HEALTHWATCH CAMBRIDGESHIRE

Our job is to make sure you have a say when important decisions are made about local health and care services. We are interested in any recent experiences you have of a local health or care services that you are happy to share with us. The big health story in the news this New Year is about pressures on our local hospitals. We know that these are linked to other issues like getting to see a GP when you need to and getting care in place when you are coming home from hospital. We have two new projects that will look at some of these issues from a different view point.

In our "**First Steps to Health**" project we want to find out about the first thing you would do to solve different health issues. Would you work it out yourself, see a pharmacist, call NHS 111 or see your GP? We all solve things in different ways. Knowing what you do can help our local GP Practices and the people who make decisions about local health services plan better care. Please do take part in our survey either on our website or by contacting our office. We also need you to help us develop our local "**Care Home**" project. We want to use our statutory "Duty to Enter & View" local care homes. This means we have a legal right to visit places that provide public health or care services, to see what kind of care they are providing.

We need to recruit **volunteers to be "Authorised Representatives"**. Your role will be to go into local care homes and talk to the people there about the care being provided. This might include talking to residents, their relatives, friends and care home staff. You will get lots of training and support. **Do you have any recent experience of a local care home, or do you know someone who has?** Please tell us about it. We will use what you tell us to plan which homes we will visit and what to look at. We are also talking to the County Council and the Care Quality Commission, to help us plan where we should visit.

SUPERFAST BROADBAND IS COMING SOON TO HORSEHEATH

Connecting Cambridgeshire is rolling out superfast broadband to over 90,000 premises across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, which would not get it otherwise.

New green cabinets in this area will be going live with fibre broadband by the end of March 2015, which means many homes and businesses will soon be able upgrade to faster Internet services.

You can find out about when your postcode area is expected to be connected and if your nearest fibre cabinet has gone live by visiting the 'my area' pages on the Connecting Cambridgeshire website at www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk.

Click on the 'my area' button on the home page and select your parish or area from the A-Z list. Each page has links to the coverage map showing the status of new fibre cabinets serving each postcode area and useful information about how to get superfast broadband.

Meanwhile, look out for Openreach engineers installing new green cabinets in your area. Connecting Cambridgeshire 'Fibre broadband is here' stickers will be applied when they go live.

Need help using the Internet? Your local library can link you up with someone to show you how, or call Cambridge Direct Contact Centre on 0345 045 5200 to find your nearest access point.
