Dear Friends

Throughout the Church of England all Electoral rolls are being made anew. This happens every 6 years and means that all people who wish to be on the church electoral roll must fill out a new application form. Being on the Electoral Roll enables you to take part in the Annual Parochial Church Meeting and to vote for the people who serve on the Parochial Church Council and the Deanery Synod. Parish Electoral Rolls are the foundation of the governance of the Church of England

Please give thought to the significance of being on the Electoral Roll of our Parish because by doing this you will be saying:

- I support the Church of England and its work in the parish
- I am making a commitment to my Parish
- I will take a responsible share in supporting and developing the mission and ministry of the Church in my parish through regular giving
- I will give not just money but myself – my time and my skills – to God in service both within the Church and in the wider community.

If you wish to be on the electoral roll you can obtain a form from Church or from Pat Smith. The forms should be returned by 3 March 2019.

This year's APCM is on Wednesday 10 April at 7.30pm in Church.

With that bit of administration out of the way I can tell you about the **New Evening Service** which will begin on Sunday 3 March at 4pm. It will be a Non-Eucharistic service of Readings Hymns and Prayers similar to evensong but with less canticles and more hymns. At the end of the service, for those who want, there will be the opportunity to have Laying on of Hands and Anointing for Healing. I wrote about this in the August edition of The Venture. In that article I said 'we need to bear in mind that in the Christian context healing is not about some magical curing brought about by a 'healer' laying their hands on you but is more like going on holiday. It is a re-creation by the power of God Spirit, which enables us to face the world and ourselves.'

I look forward to welcoming you the service and hope you will find it a welcome addition to our pattern of service.

A meeting was held on Monday 14 January in the Village Hall. In attendance were 4 parishioners, our Parish Clerk Melanie Laing, our County Councillor Henry Batchelor and the Farms Director of Thurlow Estates Andrew Crossley.

Ice Rink - SCDC have provided a loan to complete an ice rink in Cambridge following a £1m gift from a 1930's Cambridge University Swiss alumnus. It is to Olympic standard and is planned to open in May.

A1307 - the improvements started in mid-January with work to the Dalehead Foods turning. main focus is on starting the improvements reported in our September report. For more information go to www.greatercambridge.org.uk/transport/transport-projects/cambridge_south_east_study

Potholes - Recently, government has granted Cambridgeshire County Council £6.6million extra to specifically tackle this problem, which should help relieve some of the stress on our roads in the winter months.

Mobile Libraries - The County Council have committed to spend £275,000 on mobile libraries to keep remote areas serviced with the mobile library service.

Planning

New dwelling behind The Paddocks, West Wickham Road. HPC recommended refusal as Local Plan Policy H17 has not been met.

The following applications are still out for consultation or enforcement:

Cottage Nursery - retention of use of barn and storage buildings

Thistledown, Cardinal's Green - ditch piped without permission

The Stables - various planning conditions need enforcement

Hedgerow coppicing

We received a presentation from Andrew Crossley, Farms Director of Thurlow Estates, who own Manor Farm in Horseheath, and a statement from him appears elsewhere in this magazine. In addition he told us that Thurlow manages 19km of hedgerows in Horseheath, with 10% being coppiced this year and 1.6km of new planting. Andrew agreed to review the coppicing of the top section of the Harcamlow Way, which starts in Cardinal's Green. To help build biodiversity many margins of fields have been taken out of production, totalling 20 acres of land.

Pollinator Action Plan

Following a grant to support the development of a Pollinator Action Plan establishing greater biodiversity within the Parish Council burial ground and other places in the village, a working party has dug out new beds in the Burial Ground, which will be planted in April

Local Highways

Following a refusal last year we have again. We have submitted a bid for funding from the South Cambs District Council Local Highways Initiative. The proposal aims to:

- Reduce the speed limit along the A 1307 to 50mph through Horseheath
- Provide warning signs to traffic on the A1307 of the likelihood of walkers/riders crossing the road
- Provide better signage with bollards and pedestrian refuge areas for the 5 footpaths crossing the A1307 between Horseheath and Cardinals Green
- Erect signs at the right turn in to Howards Lane from the A1307 saying that the road is for local traffic only and not suitable for large vehicles – to encourage larger traffic to use the turn by Allington Terrace where there is a right hand turn lane in the carriageway.

The bid is supported by the Greater Cambridge Partnership and all work would be done in the financial year from April 2019-April 2020. We will know the result in early April 2019. Any views or comments on these proposals should be sent to johnHHPC@gmail.com.

Speed indicators

We have been part of a consortium of other local parish councils sharing moving vehicle speed activated signs. The arrangement allows Horseheath to use the sign for 2 weeks on a 7 week cycle. We have varied the siting of the sign within Horseheath and Cardinals Green. The sign records actual speeds but sadly not number plates. The full data for 2018 – which is available on the Horseheath website – shows the following:

- 17% of the traffic recorded just after the bus stop leaving the village towards Haverhill along the Haverhill Road was travelling at more than 35mph. 11451 individual vehicles were recorded and of these, 8 were travelling at more than 50mph and 50 more than 45mph.
- The highest speeds were recorded just after the bus stop coming into the village along Linton Road. Two cars were recorded doing 73mph here, one at 4pm in the afternoon. Overall, 11% of the traffic entering the village along Linton Road was travelling at more than 35mph.
- 11% of the traffic recorded traveling along Horseheath Green towards Howards Lane in Cardinals Green was travelling at over 35mph.

The data clearly shows the speeding occurring within Horseheath and Cardinals Green and has been sent to the Police and the County Council. Having this information helps us to know where to place community speedwatch teams. Questions about this project can be sent to John Howard at johnhhpc@gmail.com.

Parish Council Precept

The precept is the amount of money we receive from the District Council as part of the Council Tax. Following six years without an increase we have now agreed to raise this by over 40%. Our costs have continued to rise and we wish to start funding two projects - the two defibrillators and our contribution to the Highways bid, if successful - see above.

Maintenance

We have reported and are chasing this list, which shows some progress.

- Collapsed road sign at A1307/Linton Road.
- Damaged directional sign Howards Lane/A1307.
- Damaged road surface A1307/Linton Road junction.
- Missing 30mph sign at village entrance from West Wickham
- Footways - Damaged pavement surfaces following path sweeper
- Missing and damaged bollards on A1307/Montfort junction and A1307/Linton Road junction.
- Road drainage – Alington Terrace.

For any Highways issue we encourage people to complain independently to Cambs. County Council at www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk where there is a 'Report a Highways fault' form. We understand there is greater likelihood of action with more complaints.

THE MEADOW SCHOOL, BALSHAM

The New Year is always a good time to help children stop and reflect on the past year and engage them in looking forward to new beginnings. The start of 2019 has been no different and it has been fascinating listening to our children talk confidently and hopefully about their future. In times of great uncertainty within the nation, it is refreshing to hear children aim high with such positivity.

This year we spoke to the children about what the term 'resolution' meant and what the origin of the word was. We discussed how 're' in resolution means repeat, or replay. This is really important for children to understand, as so many of children just give up once they have been unsuccessful a first time. We constantly refer to resilience and perseverance at school, and we know that a resilient child will be more successful in the long term. We do a number of activities within school to help foster these capabilities, including Forest School, child-initiated learning, project work, and open-ended topics. Knowledge is key to a child's progress, but they also need to know what to do when faced with uncertainty or disappointment, to reflect on the challenges and make a new plan for success. Further to our discussion on the term 'resolution' we enjoyed looking at how to separate salt from water in a salt 'solution'. It was a great image to help children understand how we can keep starting again when things have gone wrong. We hope that this representation of a New Year resolution will stick with children as they go through the year, and help them to remember that every day is the opportunity for a new beginning.

The start of a year always means the start of new topics and learning within school. January was full of exciting entry points for topics, with every year group going out of school on a trip. When we talk with the children about what they enjoy most about their learning, trips which enrich their learning is always top of the list. The trips taking place this term have been no different. Year 5 and 6 spent the day at Stibbington as an evacuee to start their World War Two topic. The children thoroughly enjoyed their time spent at school, enjoying a typical 1940's playtime, playing games such as skipping and hoops. Some of the children even enjoyed their World War Two lunch of Spam sandwiches! The surprise air raid drill was a particular highlight as the children had to head out to the Morrison shelter and experience what it was like to 'keep calm and carry on' until the all clear was given. Hearing the buzz of conversations as the children arrived back in school, with teachers and children commenting on the best trip 'ever' made it evident how important these 'Living History' days are.

Year 3 and 4 spent the day learning how to be a Polar Explorer with a trip to the Polar Museum in Cambridge, as part of their topic 'Into the Freezer'. The children were so fortunate to have such experts working in the Polar Museum, teaching the children about the history of Polar expeditions, dressing up in readiness for an expedition, and exploring the artefacts from many famous expeditions, including Sir Ernest Shackleton. We have definitely inspired a whole generation of polar explorers!

The Infants also enjoyed a wonderful day at Duxford Imperial War Museum, in readiness for their flight topic 'Up, Up and Away.' They loved looking at the aeroplanes up close, walking on Concord and listening to the volunteers talk so knowledgeably about the aircraft. I think that even the adults accompanying the children learnt new information!

HEDGES AND TREES

Thurlow Estate Farms has a 5-year Countryside Stewardship agreement with Natural England which includes hedge coppicing and new hedge planting on the land to the south of Horseheath. This work will occur over the winter months starting with the coppice work and hedge planting following on soon after. The hedge planting is mainly filling in gaps along existing hedge lines to create a continual hedge. The hedge coppicing will focus on areas where the hedge has been left uncut for too long to restore the growth and habitat at the base by simply reducing the height. The vegetation will be cut to the ground, allowed to regenerate and then be managed in the normal way, being cut every other year. Ultimately we will end up with a hedge that has more biodiversity and forms a better wildlife corridor. Hedge coppicing traditionally was the way to manage a hedge, so although appearing drastic at the time it is nothing new. The better trees along each section will be left intact to vary the land scape and the rest of the vegetation removed. Similar work is occurring on the Estate's land at Ashdon and Thurlow over the next two years.

WHAT IS WALKING NETBALL?

Like many sports, netball has a walking version of the game, devised to keep people playing longer. Walking Netball is a slower version of the game; it is netball, but at a walking pace. The game has been designed so that anyone can play it regardless of age or fitness level. It can still be just as competitive as standard netball.

The game follows almost the same rules as regular netball, with no running or jumping permitted, an extra step between moves and four seconds between passes allowed (as opposed to three in the regular format). Women across the country have begun playing the game of Walking Netball for the fun, laughter and camaraderie the social session brings, as much as the health benefits it provides. The walking sessions are run in the same format as the original version of the sport - a warm-up, fun mini-games and drills followed by a full-court game. Tactics, teamwork and fast thinking make a successful netball player. These skills are taught in a gentle but engaging manner with the emphasis undoubtedly on having fun.

Despite the slower pace of the game, the physical and mental benefits of walking netball are evident. People may say, 'well it's only walking', but the challenge is in the pace of the walking.

Local sessions run Wednesday 6-7pm indoors at Linton Sports Centre. £3.50 per session with your first session free. Why not come along to see for yourself how much fun you can have walking!

CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

Happy New Year to all! It's time for making your New Year Resolutions so why not find out how to keep your family safe in your home.

At Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service, we are encouraging people to make four New Year's Resolutions for 2019 to keep your families and homes safe from fire.

- **Make sure you have a correctly fitted working smoke alarm on every floor of your house and test it weekly** – involve the children in this to ensure they are aware of what the smoke alarm does, what the alarm sounds like and what it means if it goes off;
- **Check older relatives and friends have a working smoke alarm and test theirs regularly** – you may support older relatives and friends with transport and shopping but may overlook the crucial role of a smoke alarm. We can provide testing sticks to help older less mobile people to test their alarms without overreaching or hurting themselves;
- We also offer **Safe and Well visits** to those that are eligible which covers a far wider range of areas than just fire safety. Find out if you are eligible for a Safe and Well visit by contacting us on: 0800 917 9994.
- **Escape Plan:** Make a fire escape plan so you and all of those in your home know what to do in case a fire breaks out in the home.
